HABs Monitoring Program is back for 2018

Once again we are participating in the **DEC Harmful Algae Bloom** monitoring program. After a short training in June, volunteers are given specimen bottles and online access to the reporting sites for DEC. Volunteers around the lake make weekly observations of the surface in their area of shoreline looking for evidence of blooms ever Sunday morning to Monday afternoon. If no evidence is seen, an online report is submitted by the volunteer. If a suspicious bloom is seen, a set of digital photos are taken and submitted online. A sample of the water also is taken and dropped off in Amber. The program is officially beginning in July and will continue into September depending on the weather.

We appreciate anyone who is willing to watch for this phenomenon, and due to the demands placed upon us for so many of the initiatives were working on we require that a volunteer have the technology for the following:

- Send and receive emails
- Go to a website online to submit a report
- Take digital photos and be able to send those electronically

INVASIVE SPECIES DETECTION AND RESPONSE GRANT

In June we will be begin site work to detect the invertebrate invasive species Bloody Red Shrimp. A

group of 11 scientists and will be working at night setting out equipment to detect the potential presence of the species and also doing laboratory work with Otisco Lake water. By next summer they will be able to determine through eDNA testing whether the species has ever been in the lake, and if so set out traps to capture them. It is new and cutting edge science we are excited to participate with. Also in June the first divers will begin the mapping and surveying of our plant population, targeting identification of invasive weeds. A pontoon boat with the divers and equipment will be out during week days using sonar and GPS and other methods to give us a specific map of what we have and where it is. There are a few species we are focused on detecting, if we have them, and then immediately responding to their population. Milfoil and Pondweed are abundant and we will harvest those along with any others we find. We will be marking areas for harvesting and removal with plastic milk jug homemade "buoys". They will be weighted down but not permanent or very strong. Please avoid the buoys with your watercraft or if you are swimming. As we harvest we will remove the buoys.
